Professor Dhaval Dave analyzes the way incentives, built into programs such as Medicare and Medicaid, may have unintended consequences for consumers. Giving people insurance, argues Dave, doesn't necessarily mean they have access to care. Often high co-insurance rates and co-payments discourage doctor visits. Dave's research underscores the importance of continuity of insurance, access to care, and incentives that encourage patient/doctor contact.
